## **Florida**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Today, following Governor Rick Scott's request, President Donald Trump approved a pre-landfall emergency declaration. This declaration will provide important resources and assistance from the federal government, including personnel, equipment and supplies, as well as making available funding sources for emergency protective measures. The pre-landfall declaration request is for 35 Florida counties – Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, Walton, Holmes, Washington, Bay, Jackson, Calhoun, Gulf, Gadsden, Liberty, Franklin, Leon, Wakulla, Jefferson, Madison, Taylor, Columbia, Hamilton, Suwanee, Lafayette, Dixie, Gilchrist, Levy, Citrus, Pasco, Hernando, Pinellas, Hillsborough, Manatee, Alachua, Union, Bradford and Baker Counties. These important resources will help Florida prepare for anticipated impacts from Hurricane Michael, including the threat posed by the forecasted 12 feet of storm surge.

On October 7th, Governor Scott declared a state of emergency in 26 Florida counties, and expanded it to include 35 counties total on October 8<sup>th</sup>. To see his Emergency Order, click <u>HERE</u>.

Governor Scott will continue to be in constant communication with state and local emergency management officials and state agency leaders to ensure the state is prepared to respond to the potential devastating impacts from Hurricane Michael.

#### STATE PREPAREDNESS ACTIONS

#### **WATCHES AND WARNINGS**

- Hurricane Warning:
  - A hurricane warning is in effect for the Alabama/Florida Border to the Suwannee River.
- Tropical Storm Warning:
  - A Tropical Storm Warning is in effect from the Suwanee River to Chassahowitzka.

#### • Tropical Storm Watch:

Tropical storm watches are in effect from Suwanee River, Florida, to Anna Maria Island, Florida, including Tampa Bay.

Fernandina Beach Florida to South Santee River South Carolina.

#### Storm Surge Warning

A storm surge warning is in effect from the Okaloosa/Walton County Line to the Anclote River.

### Storm Surge Watch

Anclote River to Anna Maria Island, including Tampa Bay, and Alabama/Florida border to Okaloosa/Walton County Line Florida.

#### **EVACUATIONS**

Though the below evacuation orders are current and in effect, everyone should check with their local emergency management office or website for the most up to date information regarding evacuations as they are constantly being updated.

- **Bay County** Mandatory evacuation orders are now in place for zones A, B, and C. Residents living in these areas should evacuate immediately if they have not already done so.
- **Calhoun County** A Voluntary/Phased evacuation has been issued for mobile homes and low lying areas.
- **Dixie County** A Mandatory Evacuation has been issues for zone A, mobile homes and low lying areas.
- Franklin County A Mandatory Evacuation has been issued for ALL NON-RESIDENTS.
- **Gadsden County** A Voluntary/Phased evacuation has been issued for mobile homes and low lying areas.
- **Gulf County** A Mandatory Evacuation has been issued for the following areas:
- All Cape San Blas
- All of Indian Pass Area
- Simmons Bayou
- Highland View
- Windmark
- In the city of Port St. Joe, all areas from St. Joseph Bay to Long Avenue
- St. Joe Beach and Beacon Hill Waterside of Highway 98
- Those with high profile vehicles, living in mobile homes, low lying areas, or anyone who feels unsafe in their current location

All of these areas must be evacuated within 24 hours of this notice. Critical businesses in those areas may remain open until 12 pm ET Tuesday, October 9, 2018.

A Voluntary Evacuation has been issued for Highway 98 Inland on St. Joe Beach and Beacon Hill.

- Hernando County A Voluntary/Phased Evacuation has been issued for coastal zone levels A and B, beginning on Tuesday, October 9, 2018, at 8 am ET.
- Jackson County A Mandatory Evacuation has been issued for mobile homes, manufactured homes and RV Parks.
- Jefferson County A Voluntary/Phased evacuation has been issued for mobile homes, coastal areas and low lying areas.
- Leon County A Voluntary/Phased evacuation has been issued for mobile homes and low lying flood prone areas.
- Levy County A Mandatory Evacuation has been ordered for Levy County residents and visitors in the coastal areas of Levy County. Residents and visitors in these areas should evacuate before 8 pm Tuesday, October 9, 2018. This includes:
- Cedar Key
- Yankeetown
- Fowlers Bluff
- Fanning Springs
- Any other area that is prone to storm surge
- Liberty County A Voluntary/Phased evacuation has been issued for mobile homes, sub standard housing and low lying areas.
- Okaloosa County A Mandatory Evacuation has been issued for all properties south of US Highway 98 as well as all low lying and coastal areas.
- Pasco County A Voluntary/Phased evacuation has been issued for anyone living west of US Highway 19.
- Santa Rosa County A Voluntary/Phased evacuation has been issued for mobile home parks, campsites, low lying areas and Navarre Beach.
- Taylor County A Voluntary/Phased evacuation has been issued for low lying areas.
- Wakulla County A Mandatory Evacuation has been issued for zone A (coastal low lying areas) and mobile homes. The remainder of Wakulla County will be under a voluntary evacuation order.
- Walton County A Mandatory Evacuation has been issued for zones A and B.

### **SHELTERS**

- The state is supporting sheltering operations in the Florida Panhandle.
- There are currently 38 shelters reported open and more are being mobilized by the counties.

#### **UTILITIES**

• Governor Scott has called on every local government to immediately confirm their mutual aid agreements between investor-owned utilities, municipals and co-ops are in place and effective so there is no delay in power restoration for Floridians. These agreements allow

# Office of Governor Kay Ivey

Governor Kay Ivey declares state of emergency for Hurricane Michael. Hurricane Michael could strengthen into a major hurricane with winds topping 111 mph by Tuesday night before an expected strike Wednesday on the Panhandle or Big Bend, according to the National Hurricane Center.

Alabama Gov. Kay Ivey issued a statewide state of emergency today in preparation for the approach of Hurricane Michael.

The storm is expected to cause wide-spread power outages, high winds and heavy rain in Alabama. Flash floods and tornadoes are possible. Parts of the state are under tropical storm watches or warnings. The state of emergency went into effect at 3 p.m. on Monday, 10/8.

Ivey urged south Alabamians to prepare for the emergency immediately.

# Alabama Emergency Management Agency

This agency is in charge of coordinating the emergency activities of all state departments and agencies with local governments, private agencies, organizations, federal agencies and other state governments. - A Hurricane Warning is in effect for Dale, Henry, Geneva and Houston counties with both a Tropical Storm Warning and Flash Flood Watch near and east of I65 and south of I85.
- Everyone in the Alabama warned area needs to have completed their safety plans by now and stay put in a safe location until Thursday morning. Travel may be very difficult or improbable on Thursday for areas sustaining damage.
- At 4 am, Hurricane Michael was located 140 miles south-southwest of Panama City, with sustained winds of 140 mph. Hurricane force winds extend 45 miles from the center with tropical storm force winds 185 miles from the center. The current forecast is for Michael to have sustained winds of 145 mph with gusts up to 175 mph just before landfall. Landfall will occur around the Panama City area between 1 pm 4 pm. Category 5 is defined by sustained winds of 157 mph.
- It is expected there will be widespread and significant structural damage, downed trees and power outages across portions of GA, the FL Panhandle, and south AL. Along the coast, between the wind and storm surge, the damage could be catastrophic.
- Tropical storm force winds could reach the southern sections of Alabama by 10 am, with the strongest winds expected between 3 pm and 10 pm. The wind threat should exit the state by 3 am Thursday. The graphic below shows the current peak wind gusts expected across the state.

Columbia, S.C - Governor Henry McMaster today announced that the state of South Carolina remains in a state of emergency due to continued flooding from Hurricane Florence and potential impact from Hurricane Michael. Forecasters believe Hurricane Michael will weaken to a tropical storm and begin affecting the state beginning Thursday.

Residents should take the following safety precautions:

# North Carolina Emergency Management

To prepare North Carolina for Hurricane Michael, Governor Roy Cooper today declared a State of Emergency and waived certain transportation rules. Forecasters expect the storm to bring strong wind and rain to North Carolina.

Gov. Cooper signed Executive Order No. 74, declaring a State of Emergency for 66 North Carolina counties. The order will be expanded to additional counties if needed. The State of Emergency authorizes the use of state resources to help local governments respond to the storm. It is also a first step in requesting federal or state assistance to individuals and homeowners if needed. In addition, it activates the state law against price gouging, or charging too much during a time of emergency.

## **Crisis & Disaster Resources**

Parts of North Carolina still reeling from Hurricane Florence could see sustained tropical storm force
winds from Michael. Winds will be strong enough to bring down trees weakened by Florence and to
rip tarps from roofs of Florence-damaged homes.
